Day 1: The Last Supper *Communion And Covenant* Scripture: Luke 22:14-20 (NLT)

In today's scripture reading, we find Jesus with His disciples, sharing a meal that would become the foundation for the celebration of communion in churches around the world. He took bread, gave thanks, broke it, and gave it to His disciples, saying, "This is my body given for you; do this in remembrance of me." In the same way, after the supper, He took the cup, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, which is poured out for you."

REFLECTION

This moment marks a significant shift in how humanity connects with God. Jesus introduces the Lord's Supper or Communion as a sign of a new agreement, a new covenant between God and people. Through this act, Jesus is not only preparing His followers for His coming death but also inviting them into a relationship that is personal and alive.

When Jesus offers the bread and the cup, He is symbolising His body and blood, given as a sacrifice for our sins. This sacrifice opens the door for us to enter a direct relationship with God, free from the barriers of sin. It's a profound expression of love and commitment from Jesus to us, showing that He is willing to give Himself completely so that we might have life in its fullest.

The bread, representing His body, is a reminder of His humanity and the physical suffering He endured. The cup, representing His blood, signifies the new covenant—a promise of salvation and forgiveness, sealing God's commitment to us with the most sacred thing in existence, His own life.

Prayer Focus

As you pray today, ask God to deepen your understanding and appreciation of this profound sacrifice. Pray for the grace to fully grasp the weight of what Jesus did and to live every day in the light of this new covenant. Thank God for the gift of His Son, for the promise of salvation, and for the intimate relationship you can now enjoy with Him because of Jesus' sacrifice.

DAY 2 JOURNEY TO THE CROSS

Day 2: Gethsemane

Surrender and Obedience Scripture: Matthew 26:36-46

In today's scripture reading, we witness a pivotal moment in the life of Jesus Christ. His time of prayer in the Garden of Gethsemane just before His arrest.

Imagine being in a beautiful garden at night, not for a peaceful evening stroll, but for a moment that will define the course of humanity. This is where we find Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane, a place where His deepest prayers were poured out to the Father.

Jesus, fully aware of the pain and suffering that lay ahead of Him, shows us the ultimate example of surrender and obedience. He faced unimaginable fear and distress, so much so that He sweated drops of blood. Yet, His prayer was not one of defiance but of submission, "My Father, if it is possible, may this cup be taken from me. Yet not as I will, but as you will."

This moment teaches us about the profound struggle between human desires and divine will. Jesus' willingness to submit to God's plan, despite the cost, illustrates a profound act of faith and trust in the Father. Now, think about your own life. We all face our own "Gethsemane moments," times when we are called to surrender our plans, our comfort, and sometimes even our dreams, for the sake of God's will. It could be a challenging call to ministry, a nudge to forgive someone who has wronged us, or a prompt to give up something we treasure for the greater good.

Prayer Focus:

Today, let's seek the Lord in prayer, asking for the strength to surrender our will to His. Pray for the grace to trust Him fully, even when the path He leads us on is difficult or unclear. Ask God to help you let go of your personal desires and ambitions to make room for His will to be done in your life.

Reflect on the areas of your life where God is calling you to surrender and obey. Consider the peace and freedom that come from trusting in God's perfect will, and commit to following Him, wherever He may lead.

Day 3: Betrayal and Arrest Trust During Betrayal Scripture: John 18:1-11

Imagine the setting in the Garden of Gethsemane, a quiet place where Jesus often went to pray and seek solitude with His Father. This time, however, it became the scene of a profound betrayal. Judas, one of the twelve disciples who had walked closely with Jesus, led a band of soldiers to arrest Him. The pain of this betrayal hurts even more because of how close Jesus and his betrayer were. It wasn't just a casual acquaintance who betrayed Jesus, but someone who had shared a significant part of his life with him.

Yet, in this moment of ultimate betrayal, Jesus' response is striking. He does not react in anger or seek to escape. Instead, He steps forward, acknowledging His identity and protecting His disciples by asking the soldiers to let them go. This act reflects His unwavering trust in God's plan and His selfless love. He knew the Father's plan was for a greater good, beyond the immediate pain and betrayal. The actions of others did not shake His trust in God, no matter how close they were to Him.

When we feel betrayed or let down by others, it's natural to feel hurt, angry, or even to question God's plan for our lives. However, Jesus' example shows us the power of trust. Trusting God in the midst of betrayal doesn't mean the pain doesn't exist, but it means

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we believe that God is with us through the pain and will use even the deepest hurts for a greater purpose.


Prayer Focus

In your prayer today, ask for the grace to trust God when you feel betrayed or let down. Pray for the strength to forgive those who have hurt you, just as Jesus forgave. Ask God to help you see beyond the immediate pain and to trust in His greater plan for your life. Pray for the peace that comes from knowing that God is in control and that He is working all things together for good.

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Day 4: Trials Before the Sanhedrin and Pilate Injustice and Patience

Scripture: Mark 14:53-65; 15:1-15

Our scripture for today recounts the trials Jesus faced before the religious leaders and then before Pilate, the Roman governor. Despite His innocence, Jesus was accused of crimes He did not commit.

Imagine being accused of something you didn't do. How would you feel? Angry? Scared? Sad? Jesus, though completely innocent, faced false accusations with remarkable calmness. He stood before people who wanted to harm Him, yet He responded with silence or with truth, never with hate or fear.

Jesus' trials teach us about the harsh reality of injustice in our world. Sometimes, bad things happen to good people. Sometimes, truth is twisted, and innocence is questioned. But Jesus' response gives us a powerful example of how to face such moments. He remained patient and composed, trusting in God's plan and righteousness, even when everything seemed unfair.

This story isn't just about injustice; it's also about the strength found in patience and faith. Jesus knew who He was and remained

steadfast in His mission, showing us the power of divine patience. Even in the face of death, He trusted in God's will.

Prayer Focus

Today, let's pray for the patience and strength Jesus showed. Ask God to help you face injustices in life with a heart full of faith, not bitterness. Pray for the courage to stand firm in truth, even when it feels like the world is against you. Seek God's peace to remain composed under pressure, and trust in His righteousness when faced with false accusations.

JOURNEY TO THE CROSS

Day 5: Crucifixion Sacrifice and Forgiveness Scripture: Luke 23:33-46

When we think about Jesus's crucifixion, it's essential to see it not just as a moment in history but as the pinnacle of sacrifice and a profound lesson in forgiveness. Jesus, on the cross, endured immense pain and suffering. Yet, in the midst of His agony, He chose to forgive those who were causing Him pain.

Imagine the scene: Jesus, nailed to the cross, looks down at the people who have betrayed Him, mocked Him, and are now watching Him suffer and die. Despite all this, Jesus speaks words of forgiveness. "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." These words are a powerful reminder of the depth of Jesus's love and mercy. He didn't just preach forgiveness; He lived it, even in His final moments.

This moment teaches us the true essence of forgiveness. Forgiveness is not condoning wrongdoing or pretending it doesn't hurt. It's about releasing the burden of anger and resentment, even when it's justified. Jesus's forgiveness on the cross shows us that if He could forgive those who were causing Him the greatest pain imaginable, we, too, can find the strength to forgive those who have wronged us.

Prayer Focus:

Today, let's pray for a heart that mirrors the heart of Christ. A heart that forgives freely and loves deeply. Pray for the ability to let go of past hurts, to see people through the lens of grace and compassion, and to extend forgiveness even when it feels impossible. Ask God to help you understand the depth of His forgiveness towards you so that you can extend that same forgiveness to others. Let's carry this lesson of unconditional love and forgiveness into our daily lives, knowing that it's through forgiving others that we reflect the heart of Christ.

Day 6: Death and Burial

Hope in Despair **Scripture:** *John 19:28-42*

Today's scripture takes us to a moment of deep sorrow and seeming hopelessness, the death and burial of Jesus Christ. As you read through these verses, imagine the heavy hearts of Jesus' disciples. They had lost their Teacher, their Friend, and their Hope. In the darkness of the cross and the stillness of the tomb, it may have seemed like everything was lost.

Imagine standing there with the disciples, witnessing the unthinkable. Jesus, the one they believed would change everything, now lay lifeless. The air was thick with despair, hearts broken, dreams shattered. It's a picture of utter hopelessness.

But this moment was not the end of the story. It was, in fact, a crucial part of God's incredible plan for humanity's salvation. In the darkest of times, when all seemed lost, God was at work. He was laying the groundwork for a miracle of hope and renewal that would forever change the world.

This teaches us a powerful lesson about hope; hope in God is not fragile, easily broken by life's trials. Even in the darkest of times, it serves as a steadfast anchor, keeping us grounded and steady.

When we face our darkest moments, when we can't see the way forward, we can remember the tomb. We can remember that even there, God was working.

Prayer Focus:

Today, let's bring our own moments of despair before God. Maybe you are facing a situation that seems hopeless. Maybe you are grieving, worried, or lost. In prayer, let's lay these burdens at the feet of Jesus, trusting in His care for us.

Day 7: Resurrection

Victory and Life Scripture: Matthew 28:1-10

Today's passage tells us about the incredible morning when Jesus rose from the dead. It's a story of hope, power, and God's promise being fulfilled. Mary Magdalene and another Mary went to see Jesus' tomb, but instead of finding Him dead, they found an angel who told them Jesus had risen, just as He said He would. They were filled with joy and ran to tell Jesus' disciples the amazing news. This story is the foundation of our faith. Jesus defeated death, proving He is God's Son and showing us that we, too, can have victory over sin and death through Him.

Today, let's celebrate the victory of Jesus' resurrection and the new life it offers us. Jesus' victory over death isn't just a historical event; it's a personal invitation to each of us to experience a life transformed by His power. The resurrection is proof that no sin is too great, no failure too final, and no situation too hopeless for God to turn around. Because Jesus lives, we can face tomorrow with hope, knowing that eternal life with Him is our promise. Reflect on the power of the resurrection. It's the power to overcome the darkest of nights and the deepest of despairs. It's the promise of a new start, a second chance, and a forever future with Christ. The same power that raised Jesus from the dead is at work in us, helping us to overcome our own battles with sin and death.

Prayer Focus

Let's pray for a renewed sense of joy and victory in the resurrection power of Jesus. May this joy be so vibrant and real in our lives that we can't help but share it with others. Pray for the boldness to talk about the Good News of Jesus' resurrection with friends, family, and even strangers. Ask God to open doors for these conversations and to prepare the hearts of those who hear, that they might also come to know the victory and life found in Jesus.

Excellent Job

Heavenly Father, we are amazed by Your great power and endless love, shown so clearly when You raised Your Son, our Lord, Jesus Christ, from the dead. As we end our week of fasting and prayer, we are so thankful for the sacrifice made for us and the victory that gives us salvation.

Lord, let the truth of the resurrection sink deep into our hearts, changing us completely. May Your Spirit give us the power to live lives that show Your love, kindness, and power.

We ask for the strength to tackle the challenges that come our way, the wisdom to make sense of life's difficulties, and a joy that goes beyond all understanding. May our lives be a witness to the power of Your resurrection, encouraging others to seek You and discover the true life.

Thank you, Lord, for being with us through this week of devotion. As we end our fast, we do so with hearts full of praise and ready to speak of Your goodness and mercy.
